PINELLAS COUNTY UNITY SPEAKERS MEETING

DeGeorge Plaza on Starkey Rd

CONCEPT OF GOD told at a meeting:
Someone told of their God who's love and peace flowed like a river and that the river was always there,

always available to them. It was a constant source of serenity, understanding and forgiveness. She then shared that whenever she was feeling scared or agitated or discontented, it was a sure sign that she had wandered away from the river of God. The further she strayed, the worse she felt. Sometimes she would travel for days and would find herself lost, seemingly alone and quite afraid. During those times she needed only to stop and listen for the distant sound of the river. Immediately she would make her way back, and as she got closer, the familiar feeling of calm, peace and comfort would return. Once she was back at the river's edge, serenity returned and she was filled with gratitude knowing that God's grace and love was always available to her. For me, the presence of God is like this river.

The February 2 meeting was hosted by the SERENITY SEEKERS GROUP, they meet at the Presbyterian Church, 455 Scotland (@ Highland) in Dunedin.

Dave N. chaired the meeting, he is very fond of the group, and they have a lot of fun. The members are open and caring. He invites everyone to come. Brook read the Pre-ambule and Cathy C. read How It Works, giving a big thank you to the "UNITY INTERGROUP TEAM for their weekly commitment to make this all possible."

Eugene H. was introduced as the first speaker, he was described as witty, comical and now an author. Eugene recalls coming into the rooms of AA. "The load was lifted, people described feelings that I was feeling." When he talked about himself, people would say they understood and they had done that too. He cannot explain how wonderful that felt to him at the time. He heard that half measures would do nothing, so he put forth full measures. For the first time ever, he began participating in his life. Today he has friends, goes out to dinner and to the theater. He is a published author, an ordained minister, and a manager in a government agency. He was able to go to the Olympics in Salt Lake City as security. "In the past security would have been there because of me." In closing, he told of his new hobby, painting by numbers. The more he saw the unveiling of the painting, the more time he devoted to it. That is just as it is with AA He saw and is continuing to see the essence of his work. "Thank you, and buy my book."

Ann Marie spoke next, she shared her experiences that were chock-full of trials and tribulations that she worked through to get where she is today. She worked the steps and recalls when doing step 3, she felt much closer with God. She was happy to "get all the garbage out" when doing the 4th and 5th steps. She "still has some character defects, but man, I come a long way baby." Step 11 is her favorite. Today she

makes coffee and reaches out to newcomers. "It is a miracle that I am standing here and alive today. I am very grateful." Today she is pleased to live in a nice place in a nice, quiet neighborhood. God has blessed her not only with all the AA promises coming true, but also with peace and with friends.

Scott, a member of the FREE SPIRITS GROUP, presented the chips.

The MONDAY NITE SPEAKERS GROUP hosted the February 9 meeting, their meetings are held at the Trinity United Church of Christ, 1150 49th St. North in St. Petersburg. They introduce themselves as the World Famous Monday Night Speakers group; have to love their spirited pride. They celebrate sobriety every week, come to their meeting. They are sure you will be enlightened; there is "no other meeting like it."

The Chairperson was Roger A., Billy D. read the Pre-Amble, and Mark R. read How It Works.

Beverly P. spoke first, she shared that she had received bad news an hour ago and was stunned by it. She is so glad that she is sober and this news reinforced how important making amends is. Her new sponsor had stressed that she make amends with her sister and she did. Because of doing the amends, tonight she is able to reach out to her sister with much needed heartfelt support. She also recalls making amends to her dad and he forgave her. She melted when he said "I love you," After that nothing was the same as it had been, she felt it was exactly as it was suppose to be. She describes coming in to AA as a dream and said it took a female that had no self-respect and helped her change. Today she respects herself; she is involved in many aspects of the program. She can say, "I am sorry" and mean it. She has a fantastic life and enjoys it. "I hope that you have at least ½ of the happiness and joy that I have gotten from AA.

Mike H. spoke next, he loves talking and delivered his message in a serious yet entertaining way. He loves AA like nothing else. He recalled first coming into AA by calling a co-worker named Danny. Although he went to nightly meetings, he did not feel any "warm fuzzies. I hated me and I hated AA. How could I possibly like any of you?" Today he realizes that it was because of his lousy attitude. The program taught him to be honest on job applications. Today he has a good job. He got his driver's license back, the judge told him to keep doing what he is doing. His attorney and sponsor told him to take this fortunate break and run with it.

He did. That is the power of AA working. He met his wife in AA seven years ago; he has been married to her for four years. He is active in service work and loves his group. He believes he won the lottery the day he called Danny and went to that AA meeting. In closing he said, "I have a life second to none and would not trade it for anything in the world."

John C. gave out the chips.

The February 16 meeting was hosted by the OUR COMMON PROBLEM GROUP, they meet at the Rogate Church, located at 4827 East Bay Dr. in Clearwater. See meeting information in the Where and When booklet.

Maria H. chaired the meeting. Lanni F., one of their newest members did a fine job reading the Pre-amble. How It Works was courageously read by Christen.

Tammy V. spoke first and was pleased that one of her younger brothers was there tonight. She is trying to be a good example for her brothers. She describes her life of "rippin and runnin" prior to walking into Rebo's. She asked them "what do I do?" They told her to go 90 meetings in 90 days. She did and today when she sees someone get their 90-day chip, it is wild. At 4 months sober, she started going to the ST. PETE BEACH YOUNG PEOPLES GROUP meetings, she got a sponsor and started going to AA conventions. She got into action right way, she goes to the Saturday night dances at Rebo's. "My life is not stopping because I am not drinking. I have fun." She wants to take monster steps in working the program and building her self-esteem. Her sponsor tells her to take baby steps, she tells her to "slow her roll." She took parenting classes; she explains to her son that this is a family disease. She is studying for her diploma; there are many great things happening in her life. In closing she said, "For a person like me, with a background like mine, there is only one reason I am sober and here. I don't need a drink to make me crazy. I need to practice my program, to do the steps and to continue to grow spiritually. I want to stay sober."

Jim H. spoke next; he shared how he once viewed all events, as "how will it affect me." He once liked to think of himself as noble. He came to AA meetings to get "tips" once he really listened; he realized he "did not know it all." He came to the following realizations; that he was powerless over alcohol. He needed to find a power greater than himself. That if he dedicated himself to the program he would receive the power not to drink. That if he meditated in the morning and at night and carried the message, he'd be ok. "As long as I do these things, I will

stay close to the power that is keeping me sober. We have a gift. If you take these actions, you'll get to see people live." In closing he said, "I am not going to die, this is a soap opera and I want to see how it plays out."

Marc presented the chips to conclude this powerful meeting.

The HOPEFUL GROUP hosted the February 23 meeting; they have an Open Speaker meeting each Friday, 8 p.m. at the DeGeorge Plaza, 12678 Starkey Rd. in Largo.

Norm C. chaired this straightforward and fast pace meeting. It is the first group that Norm joined and that was twenty-one years ago. It is a tremendous group with wonderful people. He said if you like what you hear tonight, join us, do what we do and have what we have. Johnny "Buc" read the Pre-amble and How It Works was read by Larry B. Each member that came had a chance to share; the names were drawn from the proverbial hat. The speakers were as follows:

Susan S. went from being fearful, self-centered and full of anxiety to the great life she has now. "There is a magic mystery that is insurmountable in the fellowship.

Dick S. is the only surviving male in his family. God will use the foolish to astound many. He listened to the people that came before him. The disease is serious; life is easy. It is about not drinking "today."

Rick S. showed up tonight to give his support; he wasn't making much headway at home. He is still working on getting comfortable in his own skin. He has a sponsor, worked the steps, and re-established his faith. He is here and he is sober.

Paul R. thought that AA people just sat around groaning and moaning until he came in the rooms and knew that he was the only burnout there. You folks had confidence and were ok in your own skin. He kept coming back and did not drink one day at a time. He followed his sponsor's direction. If this were not a better life, he'd be out drinking.

Jennifer C. was tricked into coming tonight. She met a friend for coffee, and was then told that she was coming to this meeting. She is having a bad day. Things do not get all great just because she is not drinking. She has put herself in bondage these last few days. She wants and needs to be sober and is willing to go to any length.

Katie L. is grateful that she got into AA when she did. Today her dad is celebrating 35 years of sobriety. AA keeps her humble and the best part is feeling her feelings again. Sometimes she struggles with fear, and then looks back at

everything she has gotten through. She got through tough situations and the pain has gone. Today she has self-esteem and likes her life. She can hold her head up high like her sponsor does, and that is all she ever wanted.

Charlie M. recalls that his Uncle Leo took him to his first AA meeting. Yesterday Uncle Leo celebrated 45 years of sobriety. Leo is a big part of his life today. Charlie goes to a step meeting every week and knows that he must remain teachable.

Fran hates speaking as some of the others had mentioned. She learned that doing the things that she hates is what keeps her sober. She has a sponsor and sponsors others. Going to meetings keeps it real for her. She'd rather live in her made-up world. The steps and the rooms helped her face who she was. She is so grateful that she does not have to live like that anymore.

Chuck M. joined a group, listened to his sponsor and worked the steps as soon as he came to AA. His sponsor said to work the steps, and he meant now, not next week. He said, "If your sponsor doesn't believe that, my number is _____."

Johnny Buc was the last member to speak. He is not having a great day, but he has learned that he does not have to drink over it. He has laughed and cried while in AA. He won the raffle ticket drawing for the book give-away tonight. He had the choice of Language of the Heart or the Big Book. Between this and having a piece of anniversary cake, maybe his day improved.

Be in the "KNOW"....

As everyone knows, contributions from groups make up the largest percentage of income that Central Office receives. Over the years, I have been approached, both as PCI Chairman, and now as Treasurer, with questions regarding whether or not groups have contributed. My advice is always the same – first, check in the *Plain and Straight* to see if the group is listed under "Group Contributions" for the month and/or year. If not, ask the group at their next meeting! Don't be intimidated about this, because it is our right as members of Alcoholics Anonymous to know how each group is spending their 7th Tradition money. I suggest talking to the group Treasurer, but if that person is not available, talk to one of the long-time group members who should know how the money is being distributed. Most members assume that someone is doing what needs to be done with the money from the basket, and most of the time, that's true. However, sometimes it's not and that's when it's important to step up and let the group know how the 7th Tradition works, as well as how it affects the group, Pinellas County Intergroup, and alcoholics as a whole.

Another question that comes up often to me and Paul in Central Office is whether or not a group should make a contribution even if it's only a few dollars. They're embarrassed by the small amount. Well, let's put that to rest right now! There is no such thing as a "small" contribution. Literally every penny helps us keep the doors open and all contributions are welcomed and appreciated with the same feeling of gratitude toward the group. We all understand that some groups have been around for years and have many members, while other groups might just be starting up and have only a few members. Paying the rent and other expenses - literature, medallions, and coffee - come first and the long form of the 7th Tradition clearly states this: "*The A.A. groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members.*" However, it then goes on to tell us that accumulating funds beyond a prudent reserve for no stated AA purpose can be dangerous. This reminds me that money from the basket should always be used for the good of AA, and those special group events, such as picnics and dinners, should have their own, separate passing of the basket.

Service Work got him sober

I got sober up North where it seems like the snow never stops falling and it's cold and gray practically 10 months of the year. My first Homegroup was very large, located in a clubhouse that was open between 6am and 11pm and, believe it or not, sat between two bars.

In the woods across the street, near the train tracks lived a homeless man named Tony. Tony would spend most of his days drunk. In the winter he would keep warm inside the lobby of our club drinking coffee and in return he would shovel the snow on our sidewalk. He never came into a meeting or even came into our meeting room. The wooden door to the meeting room had a small pane of glass about eye level and often during meetings, if you looked over at the door, you could see Tony's eyes looking on. He was looking on, though he never came in.

Then one day he was gone. We had heard stories about a homeless person who had been run down by a train and killed and we all assumed that it must have been Tony.

Some time went by and then one day, to all of our surprise, Tony returned. He was clean, well dressed and best of all, he was sober. Tony had gone to rehab. Looking back on the situation, I realized that all the time Tony gave service to our club when he could have chose to spend his time drinking at one of the two bars that were next door. Over the years, the service that he did, kept him around sober people. This was truly attraction rather than promotion at its best. And the "warmth" he received from the rooms of AA far exceeded that which he never received from the barrooms.

Last I heard Tony is still sober with multiple years of sobriety. He goes to meetings, has a sponsor, works the steps of Alcoholics Anonymous, and sponsors other. He no longer spends his days drunk and living in the woods. He has a job, a home, and a car and if you ask him, he'll probably tell you that service work got him sober.

Based on a true story of sobriety. The name has been changed in keeping with the Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous.

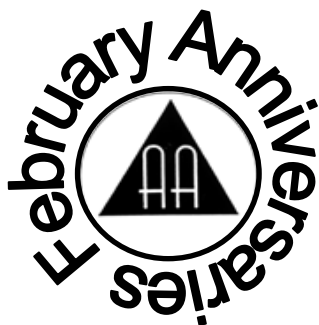
We have not had to touch our Prudent Reserve and still have sufficient money in the bank to cover our expenses for the current month.
